Pupils can self refer or be referred by teachers or parents. It is an opportunity to share worries and concerns with older pupils who may have had similar experiences.

Child Protection







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All schools have a statutory duty to exercise their functions with a view to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of their learners.

Porthcawl At Comprehensive School there is a designated Child Protection Officer, Mrs J Sloggett, and a deputy Ms R Gould. There is also a nominated governor, Mrs A Thomas. All procedures followed are set out in guidance by the Local Children Safeguarding Board, which are in line with the All Wales Child Protection Procedures.

Should any pupil have any worries in relation to their own wellbeing, or that of others then they should speak to Mrs Sloggett (M8) or Ms Gould (D10) as soon as possible. If they are unable to find either member of staff then they should speak to their Head of Year or Form Tutor.

Where a professional has a concern about a child or a referral has been made to them, they will, in general,

seek to discuss these with the family and, where possible, seek their agreement to making a referral to social services.

The school aims to create an atmosphere of openness. We want our pupils to feel secure and feel that their concerns will be listened to. What they say will be taken seriously and every effort will be made to work with parents/carers in a positive and constructive manner in order to support the children.

A Peer Listening Service is also available every lunchtime in the Student Support Centre – near M8.

ONLINE MEDIA COMPLAINTS PORTAL ~ PARENTPORT

recently received information from Mrs Madeleine Moon MP regarding the launch of an online media complaints portal "ParentPort". This is a one-stop show for parents to help them keep children safe when online, watching films and playing video games. Despite a large volume of useful tips and online safety advice already being available online, this information is often difficult to find.

ParentPort has brought this information together and organised it into a number of easily accessible top tip categories to help parents learn more about setting up online controls, improving mobile safety and keeping children safe on social networking sites. ParentPort was set up in October 2011 to make it easier for parents to complain about material they see or hear across the media, communications and retail industries. It was jointly developed by the Advertising Standards Authority (ASA), the Authority for Television on Demand (ATVOD), the BBC Trust, the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC) the Office of Communications (Ofcom), the Press Complaints Commission (PCC) and the Video Standards Council (VSC)/Pan-European Game Information (PEGI).

BRIDGEND CYSTIC FIBROSIS

The money will be used for specialist equipment to help the young patients with their treatment.

"We were absolutely delighted to receive their donation. We will use the money to purchase nebulisers for our patients to use at home. They enable the children to breathe in their medication which helps the airways to open more quickly and make breathing easier."

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

At the end of the event we were lucky enough to hear Bridgend Youth Choir which included two of our own pupils', Daniel Pugh Bevan and Lucy Noden perform "Bridge over Troubled Water".

Real Human Being

In November a number of our year 8 pupils were involved with a visiting project which sought to educate young people about the impact of Disability Hate Crime on the lives of disabled people.

Disability Wales working with Taking Flight Theatre Company, an integrated company working with disabled and non disabled professional actors, developed a theatre piece. It was presented to Year 8 pupils at Porthcawl Comprehensive School and other schools across the Bridgend area.

The pupils watched a piece of theatre then worked with a facilitator and the professional actors to dissect the issues in the piece to explore characterisation and solutions to the problems encountered. Forum Theatre techniques were used allowing the young people to work in a safe, controlled environment to revisit scenes, 'stop', 'rewind' or 'fast forward' the action in order to suggest changes to the behaviour of the victim, and explore the motivations of the antagonists. Further techniques such as 'thought tracking' and 'hot seating' characters also allowed the pupils to gain an understanding of the impact of DHC upon its victims and the thought process and psychologies which lead to someone becoming a perpetrator of such crime.

The theatre piece had been devised in conjunction with disabled people from within the local community who have shared their own experiences with the writer and director. Cast members included professional actors Cara Readle (known for her role as 'Layla' in The Story of Tracy Beaker and 'Elen' in Baker Boys) and Dan Edge, an Aerialist in the Paralympics London 2012 Opening Ceremony.

The pupils found it a challenging piece and most enjoyed talking in-role to the characters about their personal experiences.

DNA Conference: 6th form Biology

November 2012

On the 28th November, fifty Porthcawl pupils from Years 12 and 13 Biology classes attended a conference in Cardiff. The event was organised by the Wales Gene Park and took place at St David's Hall in the city centre. The event had a focus on the modern techniques utilised by scientists around the world to decode DNA. The conference was presented by six speakers, each bringing ideas from their own specialist fields and communicating their own views on modern genetics.

All speakers highlighted the important and sometimes controversial aspects of genetic research. Some key points discussed at the event included the views of The Right Reverend Lee Rayfield, Bishop of Swindon who talked about the ethical dilemmas surrounding the advancement of genetic medicine. Welsh native plant research has made world news, thanks to Dr Natasha de Vere and her team from The National Botanic Garden of Wales and Aberystwyth University supporting Wales in becoming the first nation to include all native plants in a national genetic database.

The pupils enjoyed their day and gave them a great insight into what they should expect from university in the coming years.

Healing the Wounds Charity Donation

The £6million Technocamps project – led by Swansea University in partnership with the Universities of Aberystwyth, Bangor and Glamorgan – has been created to develop those skills which will have a positive impact on a pupil's ability to better understand a wide range of topics within Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (the so-called STEM) subjects. Pupils took part in workshops and had the opportunity to gain a real insight into computational thinking, applied in a practical and fun way. The work of Technocamps supports and enhances the ICT and Computing curriculum taught in schools and colleges.

We travelled to the University in style with a luxury coach provided from Edward's coaches with leather seats etc. When we were dropped off our teacher took us on a mini hike through the campus up many hills until we reached the ICT room which was based in the Students Union building.

On arrival we were all given free pen drives containing resources and free software. During our first break we were provided with free drinks.

Pupils received introductory tutorials in a number of software programs including programinate, Greenfoot which incorporates Java programming and GameMaker. Java is the technology that is involved with many of the latest mobile phones on the market.

For lunch we were taken to the relaxed area of the Student Union. There were pool tables, vending machines and wheelie chairs/stools which many of the boys were addicted to.

Lessons were learnt when George Hurry challenged Mr. Pucella to a game of pool. A confident George setup the table in a match best of 3. Unfortunately, George was taught another lesson in how to play pool as Mr. Pucella swept him away 2-0. Lewis McQueen was quietly studying the match and he also challenged Mr. Pucella. Unfortunately Lewis was taught a lesson in tactics and also crumbled under the pressure.

In the afternoon pupils received a careers talk and were taken on a tour of the university where they had an opportunity to visit some of the facilities e.g. sports facilities, departments, food halls, lecture theatres etc. Tyler Williams was watching some of the skills demonstrated by students in the sports hall and was quite happy to have a chat. Tyler then demonstrated his own belly dancing skills which was very entertaining!

Pupils had the opportunity of sitting in a lecture theatre and were shown demonstrations of new Leap Motion technology and a video of Google's first self-drive car which in the future will help people who are blind.
