## Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> September 2.15pm at the Hi Tide: Talk by Neil Sinclair: From Tiger Bay to Cardiff Bay

Exporting over 10 million tons of coal by 1913, Cardiff Docks was one of the most important ports in Britain at that time. Sailors and dock workers from 45 countries around the world settled in the neighbourhoods surrounding the docks and helped to create the vibrant, and sometimes violent, multicultural area known as Tiger Bay. In his talk Mr Sinclair will trace the development of the Docks and the adjacent communities, their decline and their subsequent transformation into Cardiff Bay, the thriving commercial, cultural and leisure facility of today.
