Spring Newsletter Introduction

As we start the Spring term 2025, I would like to thank everyone across the PCS community for their continued support. At the time of writing this piece, pupils in Year 11 and Year 13 are busy preparing for their Summer GCSE, AS and A Level examinations. As I said last year, by the time this edition of the Porthcawl Post is published the 'exam count down' will be in weeks and days. To all pupils in KS4 & 5, I wish you all the very best for the Summer 2025 examination series – to date, your achievements have been excellent, keep up the hard work and effort. I am one very proud Headteacher!

As mentioned in a letter I sent to parents in January, Year 11 sat their Mathematics GCSE in November and I am delighted to inform you that pupils performed very well. Nearly three quarters of the year group secured a grade at A*-C and approximately one third of the year group achieved an A*- A grade. Our 'Numeracy Points Score' for the cohort is good and overall achievement across the whole year group was positive - an excellent achievement! A small number of pupils also sat GCSE English Language and again, overall achievement was very positive - well done everyone! Well done to Year 11 and of course, the Mathematics and English Faculties. Year 11 have performed very well in their early GCSE English Literature and Science examinations, and these recent results provide for a solid foundation in the future. I would like to personally congratulate all our pupils on their outstanding achievements - I am looking forward to the Summer success!

In January 2025, the Welsh Government published the final 'secondary school performance data' from the Summer 2024 examination series. Once again, we are very pleased with our performance in all key indicators which is considerably higher than the average in similar schools, the Local Authority and Wales.

The table below illustrates our KS4 performance in the key indicators of Literacy, Numeracy, Science, the Skills Challenge Certificate and the Capped 9. The Capped 9 is a point score average based on every student's best 9 GCSEs, including English Language and Mathematics and/or Numeracy. Our published score of 400.6 points is positive and continues to be a strong performance when compared to similar schools. These points scores are calculated by Welsh Government.

To help you understand the data presented in the table below, and our 'overall achievement'! provide a short explanation.

Literacy, Numeracy, Science & Skills Challenge Certificate (SCC) Points Scores

For Literacy, Numeracy, Science and the Skills Challenge Certificate, a point score is allocated to each indicator. The point score represents a grade average, that is the average grade for all pupils who sat the examination. The points score system ranges from 16 to 58 points, and this represents grades G to A*. There are 6 points between each grade. To provide a few examples, a D grade is 34 points, a C grade is 40 points, a B grade is 46 points and an A* grade is 58 points.

Our whole school literacy points score is 46.2pts, this means that the average grade across all pupils who sat the examination was a B grade. The literacy national average was 38.5pts, therefore the average score in our school was 7.7pts higher than Wales, and our pupils have scored, on average, one grade and a third higher per pupil in this subject.

Capped 9

This is a point score calculated using a pupil's best 9 GCSE grades including English, Mathematics and Science. Each grade is allocated a score between 16 and 58 (as explained above) and they are totalled. For example, a pupil with their best 9 GCSEs as x2 A grades, x2 B grades and x4 C grades would have a Capped 9 score of 356pts. This is calculated as 2x52(A)=104, 2x46(B)=92, 4x40(C)=160 to give a total of 356. This process is completed for each pupil in Year 11 and an average is calculated. Our whole school average in 2024 was 400.6pts and in 2023 it was 411.2pts.

Please see the table below which presents our 2024 performance. The 'Family of Schools' refers to schools that the Welsh Government identify as being similar to Porthcawl Comprehensive School. We are very proud of our on-going achievements; this is testament to the hard work and effort of our pupils and the unity and drive of our staff! These outcomes demonstrate our commitment to maximise the achievement for all pupils so that every pupil achieves their very best whatever their starting point.

This term Year 7 have attended a residential trip to Llangrannog and during February half term, KS3 & 4 pupils enjoyed a skiing trip to Voss in Norway. It has been lovely to hear about these two residential visits; lots of fun for the pupils and the staff! I have thoroughly enjoyed finding out about Year 9's First Give social action projects in support of their chosen charities – some excellent research, social action and presentations. There has been a lot taking place across PCS this term and this is very evident in this Spring Term Edition of the Porthcawl Post.

Year 11 have completed their A Level options and it is pleasing to learn that we are expecting a high number of students to join Year 12 in September 2025 – excellent news! It is likely that our Sixth Form will have approximately 250-270 students on roll in September 2025. Choosing subjects and progression routes is such an important time in school and I have thoroughly enjoyed speaking to many pupils about their subjects, plans and intended next steps. Year 9 have also completed their options choices as they plan for the start of their GCSEs – lots of important decisions being made!

To end, in the Autumn term I had the opportunity to speak to parents and pupils at our Year 6 Open Evening and it was lovely to see so many families in attendance. I have enjoyed speaking with Year 6 during their recent transition visits and I look forward to meeting more pupils during the future transition events planned. We welcome pupils from our four main feeder primary schools of Newton, Nottage, Porthcawl and West Park and pupils from several different primary schools across Bridgend. I wish you all the very best and I look forward to sharing more success in Summer 2025.

Cyber Security Pathways Event

Digital Technology and Computer Science pupils from Years 11-13 took part in a career's cyber security pathway event at Newport University on 11th December. Pupils were split into groups and attended many lectures and practical workshops on a wide variety of topics such as artificial intelligence, cyber security and privacy. Core topics that were addressed included the importance of early detection and automated responses to cyber-attacks, investigating goal-orientated risk, process and impact modelling, human factors, detecting digital and physical indicators of compromise, mitigating attacks and the computer misuse act. The day ended by students attending a careers fair where many Cyber companies shared their goals and what they could offer our pupils in the future. Pupils really enjoyed the day and found it a worthwhile experience.



"We really enjoyed the hands-on workshops on offer; we had an insight into white hat hacking by completing a capture the flag challenge. Another session focussed on coding websites, where we made an offline copy to fix issues in a webpage. The lecture on the computer misuse law offered several scenarios which will be very helpful for any legal and ethical questions we might encounter in our GCSE exams this summer."

number of teams with 8! The girls had a week window to solve as many puzzles as possible in their team. They spent lunchtimes and their own time aiming to get as many points as possible. Working as a team was imperative and all teams used different skills amongst themselves to ensure they competed to the best of their ability.

A special mention to Brianna Hemming who was out highest individual scorer with 2348 and our highest scoring team which was the Decyber girls of Lottie Dickinson, Liana Sainsbury, Esme Owen and Eva-Marie Morgan who had a score of 4962. They narrowly missed being in the Top 10 in Wales.

"The cyber competition for girls was an exciting event and challenging one to do. I also found it really funny like how some of the questions didn't make any sense which made me laugh. The skills I learnt form from the cyber competition were working as a team, working on different questions, helping each other for the team-that was the main thing that we did which made us get a lot of points. Another skill I learnt was using different software because you're not going to know it all so by using different software it gave me a better understanding of the question I was given. I really enjoyed doing the Cyber Girls competition even though my team didn't win it was still a lot of fun to do!"-Ruby Evans

Esports Minecraft Competition

Year 8 students in 2025 got the chance to take part in the Esports Minecraft
Competition, where teams of six builders worked together to create a build based on a given theme. It wasn't just about building something cool - we also had to present it to the judges, explain how it linked to the theme, and point out any special details like famous landmarks or tricky mechanics. The hardest part? We only had 30 minutes to finish. That meant we had to work fast, stay organized, and make sure our build looked good while still matching the competition quidelines.

The competition wasn't just about Minecraft as it helped us build useful skills too.

Teamwork and communication were super important because we had to split up jobs and make sure everyone knew what they were doing. With everyone helping, we turned simple ideas into unique designs, while problem-solving was important when things didn't go to plan. Managers also had to be good leaders, keeping track of progress, helping with ideas, and talking to the judges about the design and progress.

The different themes made things even more fun. One week, we had to build something inspired by France, and another week, we worked on an Italian theme. Every challenge pushed us to try new designs and ideas while sticking to the time limit. The 30-minute deadline added more excitement to the challenge and improved our teamwork, creativity, and decision-making under pressure skills.

"The competition was incredibly fun because it allowed us to be creative and express our ideas freely, as long as they matched with the theme. For example, one week, we designed something inspired by Italy, and the next, we focused on a Valentine's Day theme. This competition provided valuable opportunities to enhance our skills, particularly in communication and teamwork, since we had to collaborate effectively to complete our designs on time for the judges. As part of the challenge, we had to transform our chosen design into a full build within just 30 minutes. using materials and effects to add as much detail as possible. Attention to detail was crucial, as it could make or break our final presentation. Additionally, we had to ensure our creation had a 4D aspect, which made the process even more complex. Our team consisted of six builders and two managers. and I had the exciting role of being one of the managers. I really enjoyed leading the team by contributing design ideas, supporting the builders, and communicating with the judges throughout the competition."- Matthew Attard

"This competition was a great experience to be creative and spend time with people you don't spend time with otherwise. We had to collectively decide on an idea that we all liked the best so we could all be as creative as we liked! Also, the competition required small details that sometimes would just be the thing between a win or a loss! I was also able to become a manager in a couple of weeks throughout this competition and it was fun trying to make sure everyone was on track and knew what they were doing. Sometimes



we made mistakes but every week we kept on getting better after getting inspiration from the other team's designs. We also used planning effectively by creating shared documents online so everyone could put their ideas on it and to communicate well we also had a google classroom to share announcements and ideas. Overall, I really enjoyed this competition and I helped my improve numerous skills and qualities."-Sam

"We have done 3 competitions so far and we may have lost them but we had a lot of fun. I was one of the builders who worked with red stone, making the build 4D using flashing lights and fireworks. Each week we would plan out our build then transform it into a masterpiece with the help of our two managers, Sam and Matthew. The competitions were a great time to be creative and explore new things and ideas. We got better each time and got new ideas and improved skills and qualities. They have all completed four sections, (Volunteering, Physical, Skills and Expedition). Each pupil has been involved in volunteering by helping the community/environment, becoming skills, and planning, training for and completing a 2-day expedition.

Pupils will then be able to choose whether they continue with the Gold Award when the start college or university.

Would you like to learn more about the story of Culhwch ac Olwen?

The story is believed to be the earliest Arthurian Romance and is found in Llyfr Coch Hergest (The Red Book of Hergest) which is in Coleg lesu, Rhydychen (Jesus College, Oxford).

Culhwch was a young man born into a noble family. When he was a child, his llys-fam (stepmother) cast a spell on him, causing him to fall deeply in cariad (love) with a beautiful maiden named Olwen, the daughter of a cawr (giant) o'r enw Ysbaddaden Bencawr.

Culhwch asked Ysbaddaden for Olwen's hand in marriage but roedd Ysbaddaden yn greulon (cruel) a pheryglus (dangerous), and he did not want his daughter to marry just anyone. He set Culhwch a series of tasgau amhosib (impossible tasks) to complete before he would allow the marriage.



Culhwch set off on his journey, determined to prove himself worthy. He was aided by a great group of warriors and heroes, including Brenin Arthur (King Arthur) and his knights, Cei, Bedwyr, and Gwalchmai.

The tasks that Culhwch had to accomplish were tough, ond gyda help Arthur and his knights, they managed to achieve them one by one. The tasks included:

- Catching the Twrch Trwyth, a magical boar that had escaped from King Arthur's lands.
- Obtaining a comb, razor and shears from the boar.

Despite the difficulty of these tasks, Culhwch and his companions succeeded. Finally, Culhwch was able to return to tad Olwen and fulfil all the conditions. Impressed by his dewrder (bravery) and dyfalbarhad (determination), Ysbaddaden reluctantly agreed to let Culhwch marry Olwen.

But just as the priodas (marriage) was about to take place, her father fell victim to the very curse he had tried to avoid. He was killed by the power of the tasks Culhwch had completed, and the couple were allowed to priodi (marry).

Culhwch and Olwen lived happily ever after, and their story became a legend in Welsh mythology, celebrated for its adventure, bravery, and the triumph of love over adversity.




Dilwyn EvansMusic Award








Media Studies


Our **Year 12** students created a series of Horror posters...


